Our Active Curriculum rooted in liberal arts and sciences, is individually focused and combines innovative classroom instruction with project-based learning to educate future generations of global citizens who understand the wider world and their place in it.

At Darrow, our academic program stresses a multi-disciplinary approach to a rigorous college-preparatory education. It encourages students to explore the creative spaces where ideas intersect and new solutions emerge, letting them apply those ideas in practical settings.

CURRICULUM

Our Curriculum is an innovative approach to learning that empowers students to engage in research, analysis, and creative design by exploring real-world problems and developing innovative, practical, and relevant solutions to those problems.

We strive for our students to become responsible citizens and community leaders. We offer many formal and informal opportunities for students to develop, organize, and lead programs and activities on campus. The many leadership opportunities our students take advantage of are a critical element in the social-emotional learning that takes place at Darrow.

EXPERIENTIAL LEARNING PROGRAMSIndependent Study:

Independent Study is an academically rigorous alternative where students work with a faculty mentor to design a course. This allows them to pursue an academic interest beyond the electives offered. Students must be self-motivated and highly organized. Independent Study courses are graded as either a pass or fail.

Winterm:

Winterm is an immersive educational, student-led, and student-driven experience. Individually or in groups, students select a topic of study and create a prototype to demonstrate their learning and their outcome. Winterm is graded as either a pass or fail.

Springterm:

Springterm is a week-long thematic program with a focus on community service, sustainability, leadership, and adventure. It is a required commitment for all students.

Hands-to-Work:

Hands-to-Work is a community service-learning and leadership program rooted in the purposeful traditions of the Shakers. Students gain leadership skills through service with the rewards of improving and sustaining both the Darrow and surrounding communities through a cooperative effort.

ELECTIVE REQUIREMENTS

By junior and senior year, students are fulfilling their graduation requirements by engaging in a wide array of electives, including: Foundations of Science Fiction, Race: Reality and Fiction, Writing for Performance, Mechanical Science, and Introduction to Philosophy.

Students learn how to become critical and creative problem solvers and seek creative outlets for personal expression while developing the value of observation from multiple perspectives. An emphasis on project-based learning incorporates the Shaker values of innovation and craftsmanship. In addition to the more traditional visual arts and crafts, other areas of focus include graphic arts & design, website development, animation & game design, and robotics & coding.

Musicianship & Performance

Students engage in the full spectrum of music production, from music fundamentals to more advanced level instrumental, vocal, or performance studies. Beyond the classroom, students will have expanded opportunities to experience a variety of off-campus concerts and workshops, honing their performance, writing and production skills.

LEARNING SKILLS PROGRAM

This center encapsulates skills and topics outside of traditional classes or electives, including Health and Wellness, Financial Literacy, and Learning Skills. Health and Wellness and Financial Literacy focus on life skills topics including nutrition, technology use, maintaining a budget and being financially responsible. Through a close relationship with an Academic Coach, students in the Learning Skills Program identify and learn tactics to promote production of work and self advocacy skills.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

Physical Education and Sports Block participation is a requirement for every Darrow student's educational experience. Students participate in a competitive team sport at least one season per year and must complete three full blocks of physical education each year they are enrolled at the School.

ACADEMIC CALENDAR AND CREDIT REQUIREMENTS

In the redesigned weekly schedule for the 2022-2023 school year, most courses meet three times a week, in academic blocks A-G. Two of the weekly blocks are 50 minutes long, and one 80 minutes long. Successful completion of a year-long "core" course earns 1.0 credit at the end of the year. Successful completion of a semester-long elective course earns .5 credit at the end of the semester. Final grades are computed as an average of the two semesters' grades and become part of a student's permanent transcript.

GRADING SYSTEM

Both academic (A-F scale) and effort grades are reported quarterly. Grade Point Averages (GPA) are computed each quarter only to determine Honors and High Honors status.
